T₃ – TRAIN THE TRAINER PROGRAM FOR FEBRUARY 2024 FYI: What Are the AKC Fit and Fetch Titles Programs?



A small but inquisitive group ventured out to learn about the AKC Fit Program and AKC Fetch Program. Thanks to Reagan Chojnacki for running the technical side of things – her quick thinking made things go smoother.

Pam White presented the information on <u>AKC Fit Program</u>. There was a good discussion and as with any new program the changes are happening fast, so make sure you continue to read the regulations and stay up to date on changes. Prior titles are being grandfathered in to qualify for program points, a bonus for getting those other titles. There is a wide variety of activities allowed. The goal is to participate with your dog so both handler and dog are active together. Individual and Group walks qualify for points and must be documented over an 8-week period. You can meet up with other club members that live

in your area to walk – what a great way to become more connected with other members.

The <u>AKC Fetch Program</u> will be both fun and challenging. The dog will retrieve at a distance amid visual distractions. The difficulty and distance increase at each level. It was pointed out that some of the handler directional cues are like those used for field events directing the dog to the prey. Melissa Chojnacki and Gozer demonstrated a novice Fetch pattern for the group and did a wonderful job. Gozer wagged his tail the whole time proving that training can be fun.

Thanks to Ruth Miles for bringing cookies. They were delicious.





Tips from members. Things they do to keep their dogs healthy.

Jan Hitchborn:

Here are some things I do to keep my pups healthy.



We stay up to date on all vaccinations. In light of the new canine respiratory infection in the nation, I have adjusted Kennel Cough vaccination back to what was recommended in my dog rescue days and that is to vaccinate every six months.

I take care of parasites with HeartGuard Plus every month and Frontline Plus every four months or so. I live in a 2 year old neighborhood built on previously undeveloped land so trees and grass were all planted then. We don't have any small wildlife yet and haven't seen any fleas out in the yard.

Along with the basics above my pups also enjoy Omega 3 supplements by Nordic Naturals for Pets, Cosequin for joints and

a daily vitamin by NuPet. We do routine brushing of the teeth and once a year they are seen by the Tooth Fairy dental lady who comes to our home.

I also supplement their dinners by rotating toppings of broccoli, sardines, hardboiled eggs, or some Stella & Chewy's freeze dried food. Carrots are a daily home treat. Blueberries top the breakfast bowls daily for both pups and me! I do not over bathe them but they do get routine formal grooming and maintenance at home.

We train in Nosework and keep up with Rally to work their brains. Regular walks and swimming are routine as weather permits, and occasional massages for muscle tightness are a treat. I have recently purchased a hand-held LED light therapy product that my massage lady recommended. I am waiting for that to arrive.




My dog gets her nails dremeled once every 5 days up to once every two weeks. This can ensure that the anatomy of the foot is not being compromised. Owning an achondroplastic (dwarfism) breed with crooks in the leg per the standard, I did my best to allow my dog's bones to grow as a puppy without being impeded by long nails. Long nails can cause splayed feet, toe deformities, and arthritis.

To top off a pawdicure, you can give your dog a rubbing of Musher's Secret on their paws to soothe any dry or chapped pawpads. It also makes them very soft!

Don't wash your furry friend's paws too often, though. Paws carry beneficial oils and secretions that are important to a dog's health and communication with other dogs. Remember when your hands were chapped raw from washing and sanitizing during COVID? If you find yourself needing to clean paws due to any potential contagious diseases or therapy dog work, be sure to treat them to Musher's Secret afterward!

Anonymous member:



We check our dogs' nail trims every other week. I mark my calendar to give me a reminder. This is also a time to check their ears, which may need cleaning.

We have bulldogs, so the skin folds are cleaned every day in the evening with a round textured cloth (sold in stores as a makeup remover pad but works great on dogs tear tracks and skin folds). We moisten the pad with warm water or a medicated solution depending on the condition of the folds/skin.

We accompany our dogs outside first thing in the morning to see the morning bowel movement to check its condition. By this I mean is it soft, loose, hard or little marbles. This gives us information on our dogs health as well. We also pick up in our yard on a daily basis in evenings so that we do have a pretty good

idea of the dogs health in terms of bowels. If you only pick up your yard every week or so you don't have such a good idea of how things are moving through your dog or if they seem to consistently have a small stool (maybe need a bit more food) or have large movements so maybe too much food. This of course also goes hand in hand with looking at the dog in terms of weight because too much weight or not eating enough also affects health.

We pay attention to our dogs temperaments on a daily basis. Are they active, seem to be happy and playful, or very lethargic or grouchy or even stiff after exercise. These things can also indicate problems or medical issues or perhaps they need more or less exercise, play or stimulation.

We make note of ear flopping, paw licking, rubbing around in the grass, etc. If any of these things are done excessively, they also indicate issues. The point is you have to be observant of your dogs because they cannot talk to us when things are not right or they feel bad.

My point is that dog care isn't just about training your dog, getting their vaccinations and feeding them, it is also about regular observations about their habits, temperaments, and bodily conditions such as nails, ears, skin issues, paw checks, etc. It also involves interacting with them in daily situations such as, training, play, exercise, feeding and resting times.

So, we sort of look at it like they are our children: We would notice a child who was cranky or out of sorts, had a loose stool or was not eating or was pulling on an ear. Our dogs are members of our family and as such, deserve our care and attention just as we would for a child.

Pat Ingram:

I put a splash of Braggs vinegar in the dogs' water. They actually like it and it has kept my dogs from getting "hot spots". It does need to be the organic apple cider vinegar, not just plain vinegar.

Veterinarian Recommended Check List

- Is acting normal, active and happy.
- Does not tire easily after moderate exercise. Does not have seizures or fainting episodes.
- Has a normal appetite, with no significant weight change. Does not vomit or regurgitate food.
- Has normal appearing bowel movements (firm, formed, mucus-free). Doesn't scoot on the floor or chew under the tail excessively.
- Has a full glossy coat with no missing hair, mats or excessive shedding. Doesn't scratch, lick or chew excessively.
- Has skin that is free of dry flakes, not greasy, and is odor-free. Is free from fleas, ticks or mites.
- Has a body free from lumps and bumps. Has ears that are clean and odor-free.
- Doesn't shake head or dig at ears.
- Doesn't rub face and ears on the carpet after eating.
- Has eyes that are bright, clear and free of discharge.
- Has normal hearing and reactions to the environment. Walks without stiffness, pain or difficulty.
- Has healthy looking feet and short nails (including dewclaws). Breathes normally, without straining or coughing.
- Has normal thirst and drinks the usual amount of water at the same frequency.
- Urinates in the usual amount and frequency; color is normal, no unusual odor.
- Has a moist nose, free of discharge.
- Has clean white teeth, free from plaque, tartar or bad breath.
- Has gums that are moist and pink with no redness, swelling or offensive odor.
- Has no offensive habits (biting, chewing, scratching, or spraying urine, or aggressive behavior.

The Beginnings of the Trick Dog Class at DTCDC

How the Trick Dog class came to be a regular part of the classes offered at DTCDC.

Several years ago, students from my Beginner and Intermediate classes requested that I teach a class of dog tricks. Each week, I had been teaching them tricks that my lab, Sawyer, and I had learned in an on-line course we had taken when he was a puppy. The students enjoyed the tricks so much that they wanted more!

The Training Director at the time, Jan Bajovich, suggested that I develop a proposed curriculum and submit it for consideration. Rather than re-invent the wheel, I decided to closely follow the AKC Tricks Program. That way, the dogs could earn ribbons and titles, as

they mastered the tricks. My proposal was accepted, and classes soon began in 2018.

In the beginning, I would teach the next week's new tricks to Sawyer so that I could troubleshoot for potential issues. I began frequenting Goodwill and yard sales to build a collection of props that could be used. Over time, Krissy Heishman, Shari Price and Carie Turner have each taught a session, as well.

Teaching and learning tricks strengthens the relationship between us and our partners in a low stress, fun environment. The primary method used is shaping, either with a clicker or a marker word. The process can develop confidence in both dog and human, and it helps the dog learn how to continue attempting a skill, rather than shutting down.

"Tricks" are simply behaviors that are ultimately paired with a signal or verbal cue. Many of these very behaviors also occur in other disciplines/ sports. Certainly, the instructional techniques are the same.

Welcome, Re-Dedication Address

Thank you for being here today for the rededication of our building and club founded over 40 years ago and made possible by a woman of strong character and resolve, Lucile Tufte. I had a chance to be taken on a verbal trip down memory lane of the beginnings of the club by Maurine Pearson, Lucile's best friend, and she made Lucile and her friends come alive for me. Lucile had a core group as dedicated as she; all with a passion for dogs and dog obedience training. The primary mission of this group was to

How I Organize or Prepare for My Classes

I usually try to do a little preparation ahead of time, but sometimes I just do stuff on the fly depending on what level class I am teaching. I like to have a plan for the sequence of events to create a flow to the class. I might seek out ideas using the internet or other more experienced friends for unique ideas or games. These techniques might apply to any class, not just dog training.

I usually start with something fun. Like an ice breaker at a party. Something that gets the dog and handler engaging with each other in a new way. It is something that everyone in the class should be able to do no matter the skill level of the handler & dog.

I want everyone to stand up. Right now. Stand with your feet slightly apart like you do on the Recall. Close your eyes. Now reach for the sky with your arms & hands (don't hit your neighbor) while you take in a deep breath. Breathe in as deeply as you can. Hold it. Slowly exhale as you lower your arms & hands to your side. Open your eyes and be seated.

Congratulations, you just took part in a relaxation technique you can take to a show with you to relieve stress.

I strive to teach something in a way it can be practiced or replicated outside of the class setting. I try to set an example so that others can follow the same steps to learn to teach a class themselves. This is how I learned to teach obedience classes.

I try to <u>DO</u> things in class, not talk too much about what we are going to DO. Talking too much, in my opinion, is a downer for the dogs. People tend to zone out.

If we just go ahead and attempt to do an exercise with a BRIEF explanation and then I see someone that doesn't understand. I will stop everyone and have them watch as I demonstrate the exercise as I might teach it to my own dog. Remember, I'm trying to set an example for those who might be reluctant to teach because they don't know how.

Even this talk is WAY more talking that I usually do in class. Hope you aren't zoning out yet!

When I teach the more advanced classes there is an expectation that most people are working at a certain level, so less explanation should be needed at that point. But I won't hesitate to help someone that hasn't reached the skill level typical of the majority of that class.

If I were teaching a beginner level course. I usually follow this sequence.

Tell them what we are going to do. Briefly. Show them what we are going to do. Then DO IT.

Let the class demonstrate or practice doing the skill themselves. I might go around individually making sure each person is doing the skill properly, or I might just let the class do it on the

whole. Though just doing it as a whole you often don't catch people that might be doing something drastically wrong.

For instance, I judged our Show N Go the other day. I noticed someone was giving their Heel command after they had already stepped off. I've had this person in class a couple of different times, but this is not something that I would have noticed with group heeling. Hopefully we caught it in time to change to giving the command and then moving since now it might ingrained that they give the command after they move out on heeling.

If I might interject some of my personal philosophy when training: Do It Right From The Start. This way you are not having to retrain bad habits out of the handler or the dog. I also try not to bore my dog doing something with too many repetitions. Two or three times is plenty and leaves them wanting to do more. Don't keep doing something with your dog until they have done it so much they don't want to do it again. If you ate steak every day for every meal, would you really want to eat steak at all anymore?

Occasionally I use a set of notes for each week of the class. Each week has a plan that uses a foundation and builds the skill to a harder level in minute increments week by week until the final result/exercise is achieved.

I use A Teaching Phase with hands on a lots of praise and food help (luring, treating each step, lots of verbal praise). Next I might use food randomly to reinforce the initial teaching phase. And lastly, if teaching, hands on & praise aren't quite getting the message through, I might add a Correction Phase. A correction could be verbal disappointment or something physical - depends on the dog.

ALL CORRECTIONS also come with lots of praise. Follow this by proofing, basically building upon the skills that come from the foundation started.

Mostly my preparation for class is based on my own experiences over the last 30 years I've been training and showing. I bring my own mistakes and successes to the training floor. Each dog is different. I love learning many ways of doing things because you never know when that tidbit of information is going to help someone else or yourself. Many of my ideas have come from gathering of friends at the national, or training classes/seminars with other instructors.

We didn't have enough time to cover this in the talk, but here is an example of another exercise you can use to get rid of the jitters at a show.

Body Scan Relaxation Technique.

- Sit comfortable in your chair with your feet flat on the ground.
- Take a few breaths IN & OUT to relax, breathing in and out in slow, deep breaths.
- When you're relaxed and ready to start, shift your attention to your right foot.

- Take a moment to focus on the way it feels how it feels against the floor, just focus on your right foot, how it feels in your shoe, do your toes have room to stretch and relax, feel the stress flowing out of the bottom of your foot. Hold those thoughts for a count of 5. Relax your right foot.
- Focus on the tension flowing away and focus on the way your foot feels as it becomes limp and loose.
- Stay in this relaxed state for a moment, breathing deeply and slowly.
- When you're ready, shift your attention to your left foot. How it feels against the floor, just focus on your left foot, how it feels in your shoe, do your toes have room to stretch and relax, feel the stress flowing out of the bottom of your foot. Hold those thoughts for 5. Relax your left foot.

You can do this at a show before you show. Don't forget to breathe.

You can move slowly up through your body, being aware of each part of your body and letting tension flow out of the bottoms of your feet, relaxing the muscle groups as you go.

A progressive muscle relaxation sequence could go like this:

- Right foot, left foot
- Right calf, left calf
- Right thigh, left thigh
- Hips & bottom
- Stomach (especially if you get butterflies before showing)
- Chest
- Back
- Right arm & hand, Left arm & hand
- Neck & Shoulders
- Face & Head

You focus on the sensations in each part of your body, isolating what makes you nervous and sending it out into the air or into the ground.

Don't forget to breath.

Now go volunteer to teach a class, I know you can do it step by step!



Here are a few questions recently brought to my attention. I asked you for your insight. Here are a few answers sent in to the PawPrint:

1. Can you recommend a good holistic veterinarian in Dallas or Ellis counties?

2. What is the best brand of vitamins for dogs?



A. I was told my my vet from San Antonio, (also a dear friend and a fellow dog lover/owner) that vitamins for dogs were needed "back in the day" when foods were not of the quality of today's foods or when owners were feeding terrible brands (like Old Roy) but that now most dog foods contain vitamins and minerals in the food, even as additives so vitamins are not needed as a supplementation unless the dog has other underlying health issues that may necessitate extra vitamins or supplements of a particular kind.

An example of that would be: Dogs who have hip problems or joint issues and so should receive extra supplementation with glucosamine chondroitin.

Side note: My current vet (who is a well known reproductive specialist here in Dallas who works with many breeders in DFW) recommends Nutramax Dasuquin which vets sell in chewable pill form and this is also available at Chewy (without a prescription) in pills or soft chews and I am sure it is available on Amazon, maybe even pet stores. Not cheap but works really well. (One of my dogs has really bad hips and can become stiff and limp but these daily chews have made a big difference in his mobility.)

3. How often should you bath your dog?



A. How often to bathe depends on the breed, age, coat, and activity of the individual dog.

- Conformation show Aussie, weekly bath with nails ground short & daily leave in conditioner, then bath at the show every 1-3 days depending on how heavy the coat is, feet washed before each show.

-Young dogs that play in the dirt and are not showing, monthly bath or more frequent if they get in something smelly.

-breeding dogs that have finished Championship, nails at least monthly and bath ever 1-3 months, but sooner if dirty or smelly.

-Performance/Obedience dogs that are actively showing and training, nails and bath before each show weekend.

-Very elderly dogs, nails, combing/brushing, and trimming coat every 1-2 months, but bath is usually every 3-4 months.

Too frequent bathing can leave the coat dry and the skin irritated and itchy.

Keeping the skin healthy and the coat shiny and free of mats and burrs is more important.

A. How often you should bathe your dog? Well, that depends. Coat type, coat texture, coat length, maintenance between grooming visits, maintenance between baths, what did your dog get into, or what your dog has to do, etc.

The health of your dog can effect how often a bath is given. Some older dogs may have oily skin, some can have drier skin so bath time is more or less.

If your pup has skin issues- bacterial infections, fleas, allergies, dry skin, etc., a bath may need to be given more often with special shampoos, whether over the counter or vet prescribed.

How often you bathe your pup will also depend on what your dog does. Does your pup do a lot of couch lounging or plays hard in the back pasture

with the neighbor's goats?

Does your dog do a lot of swimming in the backyard pool? Dock diving? Retrieving ducks on the lake, or splashing in the nearby creek? Whether in the pool, the pond, or at the beach, bath time will



be necessary afterwards. Chlorine and/ or salt water from the beach is tough on your dog's skin and coat. Not to mention you wouldn't want to cuddle up to Rover with him smelling like dried pond water.

Therapy dogs should be bathed before they go on any visit.



Show dogs have special grooming routines and are usually bathed before every show to look their best... depending on the breed.

If your dog has a rough and tumble play date with the another dogs at the dog park, to remove any excess dried slobber, muck and mud, a trip to the tub will be in order.

And if Fido comes face to tail with a skunk, multiple baths with some deep cleaning concoctions WILL DEFINITELY be necessary!

Having a shorter coat doesn't mean less bath-

ing. Hairless breeds, Chinese Crested, Xoloitzcuintli, Hairless Rat Terriers, etc. may need to be bathed once a week.

Obviously, a long coated breed will require more grooming work- brushing, combing, scissoring,



clipping, which can include more baths. Depending on the coat length and coat texture for instance, a dog with a medium coat, German Shepherd, Corgi, Border Collie, etc., may only need to be bathed every four to six weeks. While a long coated dog, such as the Maltese, Shih Tzu, Afghan Hound, Rough Collie, etc., may need to be bathed every two weeks. Sometimes more. And short coated pups, Greyhounds, Beagles, Dachshund, etc., may only need a bath every two to three months. A word of caution with double-coated dogs like the Siberian Husky, Shetland Sheepdog, German Shepherds, Old English Sheepdogs, etc., bathing too much can strip the natural oils, cause the coat to 'soften' which can cause more mats and tangles. And extra shedding. (This holds true really for

all dogs.) Terriers, kept in their hard, wiry coats such as Wire Fox Terrier, Schnauzers, West Highland White terriers, etc., may only need to be bathed every few months.

Just be sure, when you do give your pup a bath- rinse and rise and rinse. And when you're done rinsing, rinsing again. Also, brush your pup often between baths. It makes for great bonding time!

There is a lot of 'depends' with how often you should bathe your dog but as the best saying goesgive your pup a bath when they are no longer huggable.

Legislative Liaison Update

National, State and Local

A KC sent out a notice in February asking for help opposing House of Representatives Bill 5041 and Senate Bill 2555. Both pertain to the issue of allowing the U. S. Department of Justice (DOJ) to avoid the enforcement of federal dog breeder licensing under the Animal Welfare Act (AWA) by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). These bills would shift authority over to the DOJ which is not staffed by animal experts and will focus more on filing charges, seizing animals and imposing penalties as opposed to improving animal husbandry. These bills could also potentially undermine or remove current exemptions from licens-

ing for small hobby breeders.

AKC suggests you use the following when reaching out to your members of Congress:

Talking Points:

- Explain you are a constituent.
- Ask them to oppose HR 5041 and SB 2555, the so-called "Better Care for Animals Act".
- Tell them it will do precisely the opposite of its name by removing crucial animal experts from the chain of animal welfare oversight. Removing subject matter expertise will undermine both animal care and enforcement of violations.
- DOJ does not have staff, veterinarians or experts in animal husbandry and behavior that are experienced in evaluating AWA compliance or enforcement.
- Rather than creating more efficiency, these bills (HR 5041 & SB 2555) create redundant and potentially conflicting authorities and jurisdictions. This will cause greater bureaucracy and expand the backlog of cases at the DOJ.
- Removal of exemptions for small activity such as hobby breeders will also create greater strain on the limited resources of federal agencies charged with AWA oversight of professional breeders.
- The measure is unnecessary as the USDA already can and does seek assistance from the DOJ when appropriate.
- The bills allow owners to be required to pay for the costs of boarding and care of seized animals while legal proceedings are pending, regardless of the outcome with no provision for restitution.
- <u>Instead, suggest an alternate solution to address lawmakers' animal care concerns:</u> Ask your members of Congress to instead support additional financial resources for USDA Animal Care enforcement, so they can appropriately enforce the requirements they already have.


