





Puppy Training Timeline: Teaching Good Behavior Before It's Too Late

Puppies, like human babies, do a lot of learning in their early months, especially when it comes to navigating their new environment and adopting good manners.

For tips on how to facilitate that learning, we turned to certified dog trainer Kate Naito, who is also an AKC Canine Good Citizen Evaluator and Manners Program Director at Doggie Academy.

The first thing to do before training begins

Before you even start training a puppy, it's important to focus on your little one's emotional health, says Naito, "That means making sure you create an envi-

ronment in which your puppy feels safe around you."

Puppyhood training, she says, comes down to two key components:

- Relationship building
- Creating structure

After all, once a loving and trusting bond exists, it's much easier (and enjoyable) to teach your dog specific behaviors and commands, such as "drop it" and "heel."

Growth stage: between 8-16 weeks

Training goal No. 1: Exposure to the environment

At this critical socialization period that ends by 16 weeks, puppies are students of life, Naito explains. They're curious—and should be learning—about how the world around them works, specifically what things look like and sound like. For that reason, Naito generally focuses on exposing puppies to their environment first before diving into obedience training.

She recommends making sure puppies become familiar (and comfortable) with:

Surroundings: Including traffic noises, public transportation, car rides, passersby of all ages and shapes, and other dogs.

Activities: Including visits to the vet and body handling.

"The goal is to teach a puppy that the world is a fun, not scary, place," she says.

Training goal No. 2: Impulse control

The first true behavior training lesson for puppies at this stage should be basic impulse control. "This can come in many forms," Naito explains, "but most new owners start with a simple 'sit." She likens a puppy learning to sit on command to a young child learning to say, "Please, may I have that?" instead of, "Gimme that!"

At a minimum, families should get puppies into the good habit of sitting before meal time. Ideally, you should also take things further and integrate the behavior into playtime by having your puppy sit before playing a game. "This kind of training can start as soon as your puppy comes home (as early as eight weeks), provided you plan to use positive-reinforcement training," says Naito.

Puppy stage: By 6 months



By this age, your growing puppy should be well-versed in several lessons.

Training goal No. 3: Polite play

Puppies who learn the lesson of polite play know when to stop (and can follow the "drop it" command), what's off-limits, and understand what "no biting" means. While your puppy is still teething at this stage and likely has a strong desire to bite and chew things, they should know which household items are toys for playing and which objects are not—for instance, your body and clothing.

"Of course, all this must be done using force-free training," says Naito.

Training goal No. 4: Housetraining

"This may be a work in progress for several months, but your puppy should be making steady progress with going potty in the appropriate places," says Naito.

Training goal No. 5: Being alone

Whether through crate training or leaving your puppy in another type of safe, enclosed place, Naito says the goal is to ensure your puppy can stand being left alone for short periods of time.

Training goal No. 6: Recall

Getting dogs to respond to the command "come" early on is important, says Naito. "Even if your puppy doesn't have a rocket recall, the important thing is that he loves coming right up to you."

Training goal No. 7: Continued impulse control

By this age, puppies should ask politely for all of their favorite things by sitting first—that means sitting before getting food, engaging in playtime, and so on. "If your puppy is barking, jumping, or nipping for your attention, you're setting him up for trouble as he gets bigger and stronger," says Naito.

Growth stage: By one year

By the time they're one year old, dogs should be making progress in learning of all the polite behaviors they will need for the rest of their lives.

<u>Training goal No. 8: Mastery of these basic behaviors</u>

Naito explains that while the "basics" will vary based on your dog and your environment, these typically include learning to:

• Sit, down and stay (even with distractions)



- Come when called (particularly when off-leash)
- Loose leash walking
- Drop it and leave it

Is it ever too late to teach a dog?

While Naito says it may not be too late to teach particular behaviors beyond puppyhood, this stage is critical—particularly the first three to four months—when it comes to building that emotional foundation.

"If a puppy learns not to trust humans—maybe because they yell and punish, steal his food dish to establish dominance, or force him into scary situations—you will have an uphill battle teaching life skills later on," says Naito.

Dogs who are afraid of people will have a harder time coming when called. And those who think people may steal their toys won't be as likely to "drop it" when asked.

You can make progress, Naito adds, but it's easier to train dogs who start out with a foundation of trust and clear com-

munication. And it's easier to teach young puppies behaviors like gentle play than it is full-size dogs.

But through positive-reinforcement training, it's possible to help dogs of any age recognize that it can be fun to behave politely. "In many cases, you can reverse rude behavior quickly by teaching a new, enjoyable way to behave," she says. In other words, your dog won't be as likely to run off with your socks if the alternative is to "drop it" and get a treat.

Every dog and every dog's environment is different, so keep in mind that key training milestones will vary based on your particular dog and your surroundings.

Build a Great Relationship With Your New Puppy — Four Training Strategies

You just got home with your gorgeous fluff of a pup, and you have grand visions of competing in one or more of the many canine events available. Or maybe you'd like a wonderful housepet who has great manners.

How to get started? Following are some strategies to help you build your relationship with your puppy, while also nurturing his attention, drive, and focus — skills that will help him enjoy and excel at activities you may do together later on.

Teach him that all good things come through you. Food, toys, belly-rubs—everything that your dog values should come through you. Please don't interpret this to mean that the dog never gets to



interact with anything without your involvement. That's simply not true, doable, or desirable. My dogs get plenty of what they want from other people and other dogs. What I mean is that when we're together, the dog should focus on me to get what he wants.

As an example, I have a very food-motivated dog who has to do a sit and look at me before I release her to her food bowl. I don't tell her to sit, and I don't tell her to look at me ... she offers these behaviors because they are her defaults when she wants something from me. I do not release her when she's staring at the bowl and trying to levi-

tate it to her mouth! I want her to include me in the picture of what is good.

Build his learning toolkit. Teach your puppy that learning is fun and that offering behaviors is rewarded. Your dog will be learning new things throughout his lifetime — this is the time to teach the fundamentals. Get your clicker out and teach the pup what that means, even if you don't plan on using it later. Get your pup used to being handled by you and everyone else on the planet. Socialize your puppy, but manage the environment to build positive associations. Having a bad experience as a puppy can carry through the dog's entire lifetime and can limit his potential.

Build drive through play. There are several games that you can play with your pup to build drive — nurturing his energy and enthusiasm for doing activities with you. Some of my favorites include:

• tug games, including "live toy, dead toy" — using two identical toys, play with the pup with one, then switch to the other;



- retrieves combined with recalls using two identical toys, I throw one toy while restraining the pup until the toy lands, then I release the pup to get the toy. As soon as the pup gets it, I shake the other toy and call him back; and
- the race game in which I race the pup to the toy I just threw (sometimes I win, sometimes the pup wins!)

Give what you expect. If you expect a very high level of attention from your pup, be prepared to give that same level of attention. An example is if you are at an event and want the puppy to pay attention to you, you must pay that same level of attention to the puppy. If you expect a very high level of attention from your pup, be prepared to give that same level of attention. Remember, this is a partnership. You have to live up to your end of the bargain.

Thinking Of Getting A Purebred Puppy?



Here are some helpful tips.

If you're thinking of getting a puppy, there are a few things you should know before you start your search. I've put together what I believe are the most important things you should know to help you find the right purebred puppy for you, as well as to find a healthy puppy with a good temperment.

Presumably, you've done the math. You already should know your budget for buying a puppy, as well as what your expenses may be.

Expenses include:

- Vet visits
- Pet insurance (if you choose to get it some people prefer to set up a separate bank account in case of emergency veterinary expenses)
- Dog trainer
- Food (choose a good food, because in the long run you'll save on veterinary expenses, even though the food may be a little more expensive)
- Heartworm, and flea and tick preventatives
- Toys, beds, and other miscellaneous things

Choose a breed that fits in well with your home and neighborhood environment, and your life style.

Don't choose a breed just because you think they're cute. Dig a little deeper into the facts about the breed to make certain they're a good match. For instance, if you want a laid back couch potato, you shouldn't be buying a Jack Russel, or a Boxer.

Make an informed decision based on:

• If you live in a house, or apartment

- If you have a yard and don't intend to walk your dog
- If you want your dog to go jogging, hiking, or on walks with you every morning, or you want a quiet couch potato
- If you have small children in the house, or you're expecting a baby
- If you're handicapped in any way
- If your household is quiet, or filled with energy
- If you want your dog to travel, and go places, with you

Once you make your decision:

Don't look on Facebook, Facebook Marketplace, Craigslist, or AKC, for a puppy. Backyard breeders, and those who are fronts for puppy mills, advertise on these sites. Reputable show breeders may have their own pages on Facebook, and may be on AKC, but you have to know what you're looking for in order to find them, and distinguish them from those who are less reputable.

A breeder saying their dogs have AKC registration papers means absolutely nothing. Backyard breeders and puppy mills get ahold of a single AKC paper, and circulate it among all their dogs. AKC doesn't check to keep this from happening. It's done all the time. Odds are they'll never even give you any papers after promising to, as this happens more often than not. A reputable show breeder will provide you with the papers without a problem, and you can be assured that they're the actual papers.

Saying their dogs are from champion lines means nothing. I've seen backyard breeders do this, and it's completely false. I've even seen them steal pictures of dogs winning at shows from show breeders' websites, saying they're their own dogs. Don't be fooled. A show breeder will have champions on the premises, and can be checked out by contacting their local, or national breed club.

One way to guarantee someone is a reputable show breeder is to go to the website for the national breed club for the breed you want, and look for breeders in good standing in your area. There will be a list of breeders by state, with their contact information.

Another good way to find a show breeder is to go to a dog show, and meet the breeders. Go to the grooming area before the breed is in the ring to see the dogs,



and talk to the breeders. Most breeders will be happy to talk to you about their dogs if they have the time. Understand, though, that they may be very busy, and can't talk at that time, but you can get their contact info, and talk to them at a later time, either at the show, or after they're home.

Going to a dog show is a good opportunity for you to look at different breeds, and watch them in the ring. If you see a breed whose looks you like, you can Google the breed to see if they'll fit into your lifestyle. You can also mingle, and talk to the breeders, and other breed fanciers, about the breed. Walk around the rings and grooming areas, and then head outside and walk around the RVs parked there to see if any breeders have their dogs out, and they themselves are out, and they're available to talk to you. Always ask them if they have a few minutes to talk, to make certain they aren't hurrying to get their dogs to the ring.

Those who are sitting ring side are usually the avid fanciers of the breed, and the breeders themselves. Bring an outdoor collapsible chair with you, and sit down near them. Strike up a conversation when the ring is cleared, as they'll be too absorbed in what's going on in the ring when the dogs are in there. They're fountains of knowledge about the breed, and can steer you in the right direction.

Show breeders know their puppies well. They will help match the right puppy to you based on what you want to do with your puppy. They know which of their puppies will be high energy, and which will be low energy. They know which puppies are more dominant, and which ones are more laid back. They're experts in this, so let them help you.

Getting a purebred puppy from a show breeder is the best way to get a healthy puppy. Show breeders do DNA tests, X-rays, eye tests, heart tests, etc..., to rule out inherited diseases the breed may be prone to. They produce dogs with good conformation to ensure you won't have structural problems with your dog. They breed for good temperament, so you know you'll get a dog who will have a good disposition, and won't have genetic issues, such a aggression.

As for DNA tests, know that they aren't all alike. You want to see national breed club recommended DNA tests from breed club recommended laboratories.

There are many bulk DNA tests, like Embark, that don't do the DNA tests for certain breeds. Only a couple of university laboratories in the United States do the tests. Many of the bulk tests are publicly accessible tests, so you can actually see them for yourself. However, some of the tests may not be available to the public yet.

Show breeders put a lot of time and money into breeding good puppies. They stand behind their puppies, and they'll be there for you after you buy your puppy to answer any questions that may arise. And should the time come that you can no longer keep your dog, they have it in their contracts that they'll take the dog back. You won't find show breeders' dogs in any animal shelter, because they'll take their dogs back for any reason, at any time.

While some show breeders may have puppies available when you talk to them, others may have a waiting list. Be prepared to wait a bit for a puppy if necessary. It's worth it to get a healthy quality puppy.

One thing I hear people say when I suggest going to a show breeder for a puppy, is "I don't want a show dog". You aren't going to get a show dog, unless you actually want one to finish to their championship. Not every puppy in a litter is "show quality". Show breeders sell "pet quality" puppies. This means the puppy isn't qualified to show, and get a championship. These puppies go into homes with people who just want a nice companion dog.

National breed clubs also will recommend breed rescues that are in good standing with them. This information will be on their website as well. Breed clubs, and breeders, are known to work with rescues in order to give back to the breed by helping less fortunate dogs.

If you want a rescue, check at your local shelter, and rescues within your area. Puppies are rare in rescue, but you may luck out. There are rescues for each breed, so you can get a purebred breed rescue, or you can get an all breed rescue. Reputable breed rescues that are recommended by the national breed clubs, usually vet out their dogs, and thoroughly evaluate them, so you know what you're getting. Other types of rescues usually don't do this.

Ask your vet if they know of any puppies from reputable breeders in your area for the breed you're interested in. Your vet may be a good source of information for this.

Don't send money to anyone who asks for money for a puppy in advance. That's how scammers operate. They post fake puppy pictures on their Facebook page, and they ask for a deposit, or all the money up front, in order to hold the puppy. You'll never see the puppy, or your money again.

You get what you pay for. Buyer beware if you see a puppy advertised for around \$300. Scammers list their fake puppies cheaply to lure you in. Fronts for puppy mills will also sell puppies cheap, because they want to move them out fast, since they have such a large amount, and the puppies keep coming. That's not to say that disreputable backyard breeders don't charge a lot for their puppies, because many do. I've seen them charge way over what a reputable show breeder would charge. You aren't getting anything extra for your money; in fact, you're getting much less.

Never buy a puppy from a pet store, the Amish, or a puppy mill, because you aren't "saving" the puppy; all you're doing is causing the parents of the puppy to suffer horrendously for their entire lives. You're also getting a very unhealthy puppy, who will either come to you sickly, or will have a lot of medical problems throughout their life. Pet stores get their puppies from puppy mills. The Amish are the biggest puppy mill distributors in the country, but not the only one. Google "puppy mills" to learn more.

Don't be fooled by so-called "rescue puppies" on Facebook pages that claim to be rescues. These aren't rescues; they're puppy mills. No reputable rescue has scores of puppies continuously available.

If you see a breeder on Facebook breeding too many dogs of the same breed, breeding different breeds, and/or multiple designer dogs/mixed breed dogs, they're fronts for puppy mills. Avoid them.

Look up the breed standard for the breed you're interested in, so you can tell if you're looking at a purebred. If you see pictures of puppies that are off-color to the breed standard, have eye colors that don't match the breed standard, are sizes that don't match the breed standard, or otherwise don't appear to match the breed standard, then you're not looking at purebred puppies. The puppies are mixed breed, and are from a backyard breeder, or puppy mill.

Check your contract before you get your puppy. I've seen some crazy things in contracts from backyard breeders. Look for the red flags that make it a certainty

you're dealing with a backyard breeder. If anything in the contract seems odd, don't sign it, and look elsewhere for a puppy.

Unless you know your breeder, and have gotten puppies from them before, always go to pick up your puppy in person. Look for red flags around you, but be aware that puppy mills will send their puppies to nice homes when you're ready to pick them up, in order to fool you into thinking they couldn't possibly be puppy mill puppies. The Amish, who have the biggest puppy mills in the country, are well known for doing this. You'll go to see a puppy on a beautiful, idyllic farm, when in reality the puppy came from a dirty, overcrowded puppy mill.

Reputable show breeders will usually have you come to see, and pick up, the puppy at their home, so you can meet each other, and you can spend time with the puppies. They may also choose to meet you at a dog show, if it's more convenient, to have you see, or pick up, the puppy.

When clients ask me where they should get a puppy/ dog from, I tell them: If you want a purebred puppy, only go to a reputable show breeder. If you want an adult dog, go to a rescue, or animal shelter, or check with a reputable show breeder. Sometimes show breeders have older dogs available that may not have made the cut for the show ring, may have finished their show career, or may be done with breeding. These dogs usually range from a year old to five years old. You may have to wait until the breeder retires a dog, if they don't have one available at the time you ask.

Wherever you get your puppy from, be certain to take your new puppy to a veterinarian to be examined within a few days of getting them. And make certain you puppy proof your home, just as you would for a child, before bringing the puppy home, to keep them safe.

Enjoy being a puppy parent!



Puppy Potty Training Tips



Remember to be gentle and patient with your puppy. If they have an accident, never punish them for it. If you do, you'll make them fearful of you. Just clean it up, and act like nothing happened. Your puppy will learn with time what you want them to do.

Be consistent. Get them out on time each time. Puppies have a hard time holding it in, so you need to be vigilant. If you see them sniffing, and acting like they need to go, take them out immediately, even if it isn't the scheduled time.

Eventually, you can gradually lengthen the time between potty breaks, but don't rush them. You're going to be making a lot of trips outside during the first few months, so don't expect a lot during this time.

Certain breeds can be hard to potty train, or other issues may be going on behaviorally with your puppy that are

making things harder than they would normally be. If things don't seem to be going the way they should, it's time to get a trainer on board.

Wishing you an easy time potty training your new puppy.





How to Teach Catch



To teach your dog how to catch, start with your dog in front of you and get their attention with a treat. Then, gently toss a treat with an underhanded throw. If your dog catches the treat, give lots of praise. If they miss the treat, try to grab it before they can gobble it down and try again.

Repeat a couple of times during each train-

ing session. When your dog is constantly catching tossed treats, you can start to gently toss lightweight toys your dog enjoys. When your dog catches their toy, give lots of praise and follow up with a treat.


