ARTICLE VI - THE CLUB YEAR, ANNUAL MEETING AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. Club Year

The Club's fiscal year shall begin on the first day of January and end on the thirty-first day of December.

Section 2. Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting shall be held in the month of November at which time officers and members at large for the ensuing year shall be elected by secret written ballot from among those nominated in accordance with Section 4 of this Article. They shall take office immediately upon the conclusion of the election, and each retiring officer shall turn over to his or her successor in office all properties and records related to that office within ten (10) days after the election.

Section 3. Elections

Elections shall be by secret ballot, except when there is only one nominee for an office, and then it may be a voice vote.

Section 4. Nominations

No person may be a candidate in a Club election who has not been nominated in advance by one of the following procedures:

- A. At the August regular meeting of the Club, a Nominating Committee shall be elected by ballot. Each Active Member in good standing and in attendance will be allowed to submit five (5) names on the elective written ballot. The five (5) members receiving the highest number of votes shall serve as the Nominating Committee, with the person receiving the greatest number of votes as chair. Any tie shall be decided by a run-off ballot. A Corporate Director will be on the Committee as a non-voting advisor.
- B. The Nominating Committee shall meet within ten (10) days from its election and shall nominate one (1) candidate for each office to be voted upon at the Annual Meeting in November, and shall secure the consent of each nominee. These candidates shall be published in the September Pawprint and announced at the September regular meeting of the Club.
- C. Additional nominations may be made at the October regular meeting of the Club by any members in attendance provided that the person so nominated has signified in advance and in writing his or her willingness to be a candidate. No person may be a candidate for more than one (1) position. Additional nominations, which are provided for herein, may be made only from among those members who have not accepted a nomination from the Nominating Committee.
- Nominations cannot be made at the Annual Meeting or in any manner other than as provided in this section.

A Note from Your Training Director



Do you remember "Do Overs"? When we were young, and something went terribly wrong we called for a "do over" and whatever catastrophe just happened was erased. Well, as adults we can't just call for a do over. But is that a bad thing?

You've been training your dog and making progress. Then one day, there is no connection, the exercises that were coming along are worse than when you started training them, or your dog is doing their best to avoid you. Sometimes this happens in a private training session or my favorite - in a very public show ring. Trying to sink into the floor isn't going to happen. You want to be furious with your dog (because it must be their fault), but when you seriously look at your dog, they are not happy. Rather than seeing this as a failing event, you have an opportunity. If you recorded the training or ring performance, you could review it and identify possible causes for the trouble. This information can then be

used to create a training plan to prevent this issue in the future. We humans don't always willingly stretch past our comfort zone or make changes in our approach because it was working before and comfortable. (The old "if it ain't broke don't fix it" approach.) Failures or disasters force us to examine issues and adjust. We can't erase what happened, but we can learn from it and become better trainers. Don't stay in the bad moment. Use those bad events as additional information and make improvements to build a better foundation that is more solid and less likely to unravel in the future.

Thank you to Syrvie INUZZOME In sentation on Impulse Control. Those that athank you to Sylvie Nuzzolilo for the pretended received a lot of information with visual demonstrations. Gryffin did a perfect job demonstrating the concepts being discussed. I went into the night assuming we would be learning about how to stop the dog from being a "see and doer" to complying nicely to the exercises that I want them to perform. Was I short sighted! We learned that we need to observe our dogs and learn what they are telling us about their current state of mind. Are they doing stress shakes? Are their ears back? Are they nervously watching the environment? Are they trying to get behind you or jump on you? Are they not offering trained default behaviors? Are they trying to self-sooth to relieve the stress? Is that correction you are about to give going to help or send the dog into the outer zone where they are not capable of learning? Are you saying "No" to stop a behavior rather than helping train the dog through the part that was wrong.

We need to be concise in our criteria we communicate to the dog. The picture must be the same every time. No excuses – that creates confusion. Excuses make us humans feel better not the dog. We cannot get lazy and phone in the training because we are having a bad day. If you can't give your dog 100% in the training session, maybe you should not train that day rather than do something that will create a problem down the road. Take time to work through any problem your dog is having at the speed they need. If chewing on a bumper is soothing to your dog, find ways to incorporate that into show site activities. There are many roads to reach a destination. Choose the one that will benefit your dog and build the relationship that lets your dog know you will always have their back in every situation. My head is swimming with questions.

Information We Need to Know

Missed Class Policy

Attending class for free is a benefit of membership. Entering a class prevents both members and non-members from class participation once the class limit has been reached. If a non-member cannot register revenue for the club is lost.



Hydrotherapy for Dogs: A Growing Trend in Canine Physical Therapy

Lumans have known for millennia about the healing properties of water for injuries and aching joints. But it's only recently that dogs have begun to enjoy the benefits of hydrotherapy. Is it simply another pet health craze, or does it work?

What Is Hydrotherapy?

Hydrotherapy literally means water therapy and can refer to any therapeutic use of water to aid or improve health. For humans, hydrotherapy includes exercises such as swimming and water aerobics, as well as more sedentary activities like saunas, whirlpool baths, and mineral baths. Exercising in water has the benefit of providing both buoyancy and resistance, making it possible to strengthen and condition muscles and build endurance without placing stress on joints. Bathing in hot water can also dilate blood vessels and relax joints and muscles, easing aches and pains and aiding in healing of injuries.

Hydrotherapy for Dogs



While humans have been incorporating water therapy into their exercise and health practices since before the Roman Empire, hydrotherapy for dogs came about much more recently, by way of the horse-racing industry. Revealing the healing and conditioning benefits of having racehorses walk in water, the practice was soon adapted for greyhounds in the racing industry. The invention of underwater treadmills for dogs soon followed, and, after that, the practice quickly branched out to dogs in general.

For dogs, hydrotherapy usually consists of either swimming or walking in water, whether in shallow water along the beach or on an underwater

treadmill. "Exercising in water can be recreational, like what many people may do with their pets in their pool or at a beach," says Dr. Tari Kern, DVM, a certified canine rehabilitation practitioner at Pawsitive Steps Rehabilitation and Sports Medicine. "However, hydrotherapy can also be used as part of a very specific, structured program with the goal of easing arthritis discomfort in pets, improving function after injury or surgical procedures, and even for optimizing conditioning of animal athletes."

Treating Dogs With Hydrotherapy

Canine hydrotherapy can help treat a wide range of injuries and health conditions. "The low-impact nature of hydrotherapy exercise allows for its use in patients of all ages, including geriatric patients with arthritis and muscle atrophy or wasting," says Dr. Kern.

Water therapy can also be beneficial in treating:

- Neurological problems
- ACL injuries
- Other orthopedic injuries or conditions
- Post-surgical healing and recovery
- Weight loss
- Metabolic conditions, such as Cushing's Disease and diabetes, which can cause muscles to atrophy

The type of hydrotherapy prescribed depends on the condition being treated, as well as on the condition of the dog. "Swimming provides a good cardiovascular workout, works the core musculature and can help to



increase the overall burn of calories. However, it is very difficult to modify swimming as an exercise in general. As a result, it's challenging to use swimming for broad-scale rehabilitation," Dr. Kern explains. "[An] underwater treadmill offers better 'on-demand' control of an exercise program and allows modifications to be made more specific. The depth of the water and speed of the treadmill can be quickly adjusted to provide different experiences for the pet. This allows the effects of the exercise to be tailored more specifically to the overall goal of hydrotherapy and each pet's unique needs and possible limitations."

But with all of hydrotherapy's benefits, it's not a panacea, Dr. Kern cautions. "Hydrotherapy is a great tool to use, but it is simply one treatment modality. Water-based exercises can help to rebuild muscle mass, promote cardiovascular output and improve stamina. However, it cannot target specific individual muscles for strengthening or reduce local inflammation or pain. The best rehabilitation plan should be individualized for each pet and incorporate a combination of modalities that best help to address all of the problems that need to be corrected."

Hydrotherapy for Physical Conditioning and Injury Prevention



For sporting dogs and other highly active breeds, recreational hydrotherapy is a great way to add physical conditioning exercises that help increase stamina and endurance as well as strengthen muscles, all of which can improve athletic performance and help guard against muscle strain and injuries. "Positive results can often be seen quickly when incorporating hydrotherapy into athletic conditioning programs, as exercise in water can accelerate results when compared to similar landbased exercises," says Dr. Kern. "For example, trotting in the underwater treadmill with the water at elbow height for 2 miles would be approximately the equivalent amount of exercise as running 4 to 5 miles on land with less concussive forces on the joints."

But hydrotherapy should only be one part of an overall training program. "An athlete needs exercises that mirror their sport and should not exclusively do hydrotherapy when training," Dr. Kern warns. "It should be considered as an addition to the athlete's regular exercise program to help diversify and challenge their muscles, similar to cross-training. Working with a rehabilitation and sports medicine veterinarian and their team can significantly up the level of the program also, compared to trying to go it alone."

Dog Hydrotherapy at Home

Hydrotherapy doesn't always need to be done in a clinical setting. Recreational hydrotherapy for exercise and conditioning, such as swimming or walking in water, can be done at home in a swimming pool or in a larger body of water. For small breeds, a kiddie pool in the back yard can do in a pinch. But not all dogs are natural swimmers, so it's important to closely supervise your dog. "We recommend always using a correctly fitting flotation or buoyancy jacket with pets while in the water, in case they get tired or need assistance," says Dr. Kern.



"If the pet is otherwise healthy and swimming for basic exercise and fun, toys that float, and controlled fetch games can be used to mix things up a bit."

It's also important not to force dogs who don't enjoy swimming or water sports. "It may result in injury for the pet or the person or both. If your veterinarian believes that swimming would benefit your pet, but they are anxious about water, it's best to seek professional guidance to help teach them," says Dr. Kern. He also advises against attempting to provide medical hydrotherapy by yourself. "If the pet has medical conditions, attempting hydrotherapy at home is not advised. For those pets, using an

underwater treadmill in a professional setting would be best, so that the exercises and the height of the water can be adjusted by the veterinary rehabilitation team based on the pet's abilities."

If you're considering adding water exercises to your dog's physical conditioning and training regimen, be sure to first clear it with your vet. Not all dogs are a good candidate for this type of exercise. "If signs of stress are observed, the activity should be stopped immediately," Dr. Kern also warns. "Pets that are anxious or stressed may experience increased blood pressure and increased heart rates. Others may panic and flail about in water, which may create back muscle pain. The goal of hydrotherapy is gentle exercise and anything that is observed contrary to this plan means the activity must stop immediately."

With the proven efficacy of hydrotherapy for aiding in healing and recovery, hydrotherapy clinics are popping up all over the United States. More and more veterinarians are also adding aquatic therapy equipment to their facilities. If you believe your dog might benefit from hydrotherapy, talk to your vet about the options available in your area—look for trained and certified rehabilitation specialists. It's also a good idea to visit the facilities to talk to the providers and see their equipment before booking a session for your dog.

While costs will vary from one provider to the next, on average you can expect to pay around \$35 to \$45 for an initial consultation. After that, you'll likely pay \$20 to \$30 for a swim therapy session and \$35 to \$50 for an underwater treadmill session.

We adopted a Giant Schnauzer puppy in April of this year. According to information we received, we are at least her fifth owners and she is only a little over a year old. One of the previous owners was a homeless man. Needless to say, Luna was very malnourished when we received her.

During our evaluation period, we had both Donna Heishman and Pam White evaluate her, as well as our veterinarian. She weighed only 35 pounds and was very skinny. In the photo at left, you see Pam White giving her swimming lessons. Because she is a large

breed dog, we wanted to give her the best opportunity to improve her muscle strength and joints. Pam has been working with her Luna takes weekly swimming lessons and has become an avid swimmer. The exercise in water has helped developed her muscles and body strength. We used to laugh that she ran like the cartoon dog, Marmaduke. The swimming has improved her coordination exponentially. We are continuing her swimming lessons and she has gone on to dock diving lessons, too.



Luna currently weighs over 46 pounds and has grown over an inch in height. We rec-

ommend swimming as a great conditioner. We want to give her the best opportunity we can to make up for the months she was not fed appropriately and to hopefully prevent her getting hip dysplasia. Proper nutrition, good training and exercise have made a big difference in our girl.

By the way, we are definitely a schnauzer family. We still have Kelly Kozmo (14), a miniature schnauzer; two standard schnauzers, Fiona (13) and BeBe (7); and now Luna, our Giant Schnauzer (about 15 months).

Dog Registration

R egistering your dog with organizations is often the first step in building their doggie resume with achievements and titles! Not only is registration required for dog sports, but often, it can track your dog's lineage through a pedigree.

Kennel Clubs

AKC

The most popular kennel club is the American Kennel Club (AKC), which hosts the most frequent dog events, such as conformation, obedience, rally, and scent work. You may be familiar with the three main ways to register with AKC:

- Traditional purebred registration,
- Purebred Alternative Listing (PAL formally called Indefinite Listing Priviledge (ILP))
- Canine Partners (for mixed breeds)

To be discussed further in the article is another avenue for AKC registration called Alternative Registry Research.

The first option allows registered dogs into applicable dog sports, including conformation. The PAL and Canine Partners allow dogs without a pedigree to participate in dog sports after spaying or neutering. The PAL registration requires manual approval for visual breed verification while Canine Partners can be completed online and approved quickly.

Within the traditional purebred registration world, you may see the following terms:

- Full registration
- Limited registration
- Conditional registration

Full registration allows for full breeding rights and litter registration. Limited registration are imposed by the breeder when they expect the puppy to be altered as they don't deem the puppy to be of breeding or show quality. Limited registered dogs cannot be shown in conformation and must get approval from the breeder for any litter registrations. Conditional registration occurs with a dog was registered with a full or limited registration, but somewhere along the line the lineage has become questionable. This often happens when the registered sire is determined to not be the sire through DNA testing under the AKC DNA profile program. A dog's full registration can be changed to conditional registration, which would not allow them to be shown in conformation and three generations would only be eligible for conditional registration.

UKC

The United Kennel Club (UKC) is another popular kennel club which maintains pedigrees and offers dog sports. Most folks will use this kennel club if their breed is not yet recognized by AKC, desire an additional avenue to participate in dog sports, or do not desire to meet the criteria for AKC registration (such as not altering their dog). UKC offers the following registration options:

- Permanent registration (both parents are UKC registered dogs)
- Single registration (parents not UKC registered, but the pedigree is from a recognized organization)

- Performance listing (sports participation only)
- Bloodlines listing services (for new breeds to establish pedigrees)

The permanent and single registrations function very similarly. The dog is eligible to participate in UKC conformation event and both offer a pedigree service; however, the single registration duplicates the pedigree from the recognized organization. Performance listing is for mixed breeds or purebred dogs but does not require documentation of breed registration from another organization. Bloodlines listing began to be offered early 2024 is an extension of the performance listing service and does not allow for conformation entry.

Some DTCDC members may find themselves interested in registering with the UKC to have another avenue to participate in nosework. The UKC is known have extended registration processing times. While you can pay for expedited registration, you can also elect to either use a Temporary Listing (TL) Number or use the Performance Listing (PL) number. Both options provide numbers almost instantly; however, only the TL number will allow for conformation participation. A TL is \$20 can be transferred to a single registration at a later date.

If your dog is not eligible for conformation, you already have a pedigree, or you only want to participate in AKC conformation, you may want to select the PL option. This allows you to save on registration fees and processing time. Single registration currently costs \$30 with an additional \$30 for dogs over a year old. PLs are \$20 and can reflect a purebred, if applicable, and still accumulate titles and awards granted during events.

Some other considerations is AKC allows up to 50 characters in a dog's name while UKC only allows for 30 characters. UKC also offers attractive premium pedigree certificates for single or permanent registered dogs up to seven generations with metallic enhancements.



Other Registration Organizations

While AKC and UKC are the most recognizable registration clubs, there are also other methods to register your dog for either breed registration or sports registration. Breed registration are clubs which independently register that particular breed to maintain a pedigree, such as the Australian Shepherd Club of America (ASCA - which also offers a scent detection program). Registered dogs can often earn titles from this club and require a separate payment and registration number. Sport clubs will register dogs regardless of their AKC or UKC registered or pedigree status to allow them to participate in that particular sport, such as Barn Hunt Association, North American Diving Dogs, or United States Dog Agility Association.

Another type of registration is offered by organizations such as Continential Kennel Club (CKC), American Canine Association (ACA), International Canine Association (ICA) and United All Breed Registry (UABR). These organizations have a lower reputation than the AKC and UKC and don't have the same requirements for pedigree accuracy. For example, these organizations will accept a pedigree from AKC, and does not maintain the lineage past four or more generations. These registries are often used by 'puppy mills' or 'commercial dog breeders' as they do not have a compliance department like the AKC does.

AKC Alternative Registry Research

As mentioned earlier, the AKC offers a service to add dogs who are purebred and whose parents are not registered with AKC to be added back into the stud book. In my particular situation, I obtained two CKC registered Italian Greyhounds from what we would call a 'backyard breeder'. Their dam is AKC registered, but the sire is not. However, the AKC offers an avenue to include dogs in these situations if the pedigree can be traced to an un-broken lineage of AKC registered dogs.

My dogs have ancestors who were sold from puppy mills into pet stores and were eventually registered with CKC and ACA. However, AKC accepts these documented pedigrees and logs "unregistered" dogs in the re-contructed pedigree if the parents are AKC registered. This service from AKC is free, takes approximately 4-6 weeks, and registration is \$50 if the dog is found to be eligible to be AKC registered.

In my situation, I have used a site called "Breed Archive" to link to re-construct my dog's pedigrees and ordered AKC research pedigrees when I reached the end of the line. One can use the "Free Dog Lookup" on the AKC site after signing on to your account and search for a dog using their breed and registered name if you do not have the AKC registration number. ACA also offers pedigree re-prints if you have the ACA registration number. CKC will only mail pedigrees to the owner on file. Therefore, if you have a non-AKC pedigree, you can use the AKC tool to identify potentially AKC registered dogs on the pedigree, note the AKC registration number and re-contruct a connection to AKC stock.





Frozen Summer Dog Licks

Ingredients

- 32 oz. Greek yogurt
- 2 Tbs. of honey
- Fruit of your choice

Directions

You want more yogurt than anything. Mix all together and put in ice trays. You can mix in a blender if desired for more evenly distributed fruit pieces. Freeze and hand them out to hot pups. They will give you many grins and kisses.



Fall Tummie Yummies

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 1/4 cup pumpkin
- 1/4 cup chicken stock
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1 cup flour

Directions

Mix and roll out to desired thickness. Bake at 350° F for 15 minutes for soft, chewy treats and 30 minutes for crunchy treats. Give to hungry pups as a reward after a good training session. You will see many droolies.



Meatballs without the Balls

Ingredients

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup Grated cheese
- 1 cup bread crumbs

Directions

Mix together and mash to desired thickness. Spread thinly on a cookie sheet. Bake at 350° F until cooked through. Cut them into bite size pieces and serve generously to drooling pups.

Bake-o Bacon Treats

Ingredients

- 2.5 oz low sodium bacon bits
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup tapioca flour
- 2 Tbs olive oil
- 1/2 cup mozzarella cheese
- chicken strock or broth as needed

Directions

Put all of the ingredients in a blender or food processor and puree it. Add enough chicken broth or water to make it like pancake batter. Bake at 350° F until cooked, about 15 minutes for soft treats.



Tuna Fudge for Pups

Ingredients

- 25 oz. cans of tune including water (can use canned chicken or salmon, wet dog food, etc.)
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup tapioca flour
- 1 cup flour
- 2 Tbs oil
- spices that you or your dog prefer

Directions

Place all the ingredients in a large bowl or your food processor and blend until all is smooth. Pour into a 9 x 13 pan. Bake at 350° F until done. If you desired for crunchy treats, cut the treats into bite size pieces and put them back in the oven until they are crispy.



Peanut Butter Chewies

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 1/2 cup peanut butter (no erythritol)
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- flour just to make a good paste
- water

Directions


Melt the peanut butter in the microwave for about 30 seconds. Place the peanut butter in a food processor with remaining ingredients and blend it to make a pancake batter consistency. Legislative Liaison Update National, State and Local

At the National Level:

New regulations from the CDC for the importation of dogs and cats into the United States went into effect in August 2024. AKC is concerned about the impacts these new rules will have on low-risk importations which are from countries that are rabies free or have a very low risk of rabies. AKC believes these new regulations will particularly impact dog enthusiasts and breeders.

The CDC document can be read in full here: new regulations from the Centers for Disease Control

AKC has been communicating with the CDC to address these concerns but has stated that the most effective way to have these concerns addressed is for dog enthusiasts and breeders to contact the CDC and members of Congress to share concerns. To assist in this, AKC has offered a new sample letter that can be personalized and sent to the CDC and Congress to ask them to consider the implications of the regulations on responsible dog owners and breeders.

Touch the Touch Stick

In this trick, you will teach your dog to touch the end of a "Touchstick." This is just a wooden dowel or stick that's around 36 inches long and 3/8 inches thick.



Step 1: Hold your touch stick away from you and wait.

Step 2: Dogs are naturally curious, so when your dog touches it with his nose or mouth, mark and treat. Keep doing this until he starts touching the stick without hesitation. If he isn't curious about the touch stick, put peanut butter on it to make it more interesting. Be sure to mark and treat.

Step 3: Next time he touches the stick, mark and treat, giving the command, "touch" at the same time.

Step 4: When he can touch the stick on command, give him a jackpot, and make sure to praise him for his good work.








TERRI CLARY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

- A. Serve as chair or working member of a DTCDC committee
- B. Perform tasks on behalf of DTCDC not formally assigned to a committee
- C. Serve as an instructor or an assistant in DTCDC training classes
- D. If elected, carry out the duties of a position on the Board
