ARTICLE VI - THE CLUB YEAR, ANNUAL MEETING AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. Club Year

The Club's fiscal year shall begin on the first day of January and end on the thirty-first day of December.

Section 2. Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting shall be held in the month of November at which time officers and members at large for the ensuing year shall be elected by secret written ballot from among those nominated in accordance with Section 4 of this Article. They shall take office immediately upon the conclusion of the election, and each retiring officer shall turn over to his or her successor in office all properties and records related to that office within ten (10) days after the election.

Section 3. Elections

Elections shall be by secret ballot, except when there is only one nominee for an office, and then it may be a voice vote.

Section 4. Nominations

No person may be a candidate in a Club election who has not been nominated in advance by one of the following procedures:

- A. At the August regular meeting of the Club, a Nominating Committee shall be elected by ballot. Each Active Member in good standing and in attendance will be allowed to submit five (5) names on the elective written ballot. The five (5) members receiving the highest number of votes shall serve as the Nominating Committee, with the person receiving the greatest number of votes as chair. Any tie shall be decided by a run-off ballot. A Corporate Director will be on the Committee as a non-voting advisor.
- B. The Nominating Committee shall meet within ten (10) days from its election and shall nominate one (1) candidate for each office to be voted upon at the Annual Meeting in November, and shall secure the consent of each nominee. These candidates shall be published in the September Pawprint and announced at the September regular meeting of the Club.
- C. Additional nominations may be made at the October regular meeting of the Club by any members in attendance provided that the person so nominated has signified in advance and in writing his or her willingness to be a candidate. No person may be a candidate for more than one (1) position. Additional nominations, which are provided for herein, may be made only from among those members who have not accepted a nomination from the Nominating Committee.
- D. Nominations cannot be made at the Annual Meeting or in any manner other than as provided in this section.

A Note from Your Training Director

On the 14th and 15th of September Paul and Debbie Cantwell conducted a **Heeling Seminar**. This Was the first time they had done a seminar on Heeling. It was a very informative class with thought provoking ideas with group and individual participation. The Training Committee would like to thank them both for putting the seminar together. We are so fortunate as a club to have trainers that have spent so much time learning skills and that they are willing to pass on their knowledge to our club members. Everyone present is looking forward to another seminar conducted by the Cantwell's. Thanks also to those who brought snacks on both days. Below is a list of just a small portion of the take aways we experienced.

A Baker's Dozens of Treats from the Heeling Seminar

Question 1	How important is it to plan your training?		
Answer	Setting goals is very important. Use a journal. It will help you keep on track to ac-		
	complish your training goals. It is vital for long-term success.		
Question 2	How important is it to journal your training plan?		
Answer	This helps you track your progress and know your victories.		
Question 3	What is the correct position for heeling?		
Answer	In between the head and shoulder (neck) on the seam of your pant leg.

Question 4	How do you start teaching your dog the correct heeling position?
Answer	Luring is a good method. It has high rates of reinforcement. Be sure to use concise communication and take your time.

Question 5	How do you keep your dog's attention?
Answer	A significant number of repetitions will need to occur to ensure you have a strong "watch me" command. Create a strong relationship (spending time and building trust). Once the dog understands the watch command then start using random and or variable rates of reinforcement.
Question 6	Explain the difference in food values and how to use them.
Answer	Low-value treats are used for easy or known tasks. High-value treats are used for the most difficult tasks. Kibble is an example of a low-value food reward, cheese may be a medium food reward value, and meat rolls, hot dogs, or steak bites would be a high-value food reward. Start with the low-value food rewards to see if you can train or teach the behavior. Then progress to high values as needed.
Question 7	Why is it important to have a highly motivated dog?
Answer	The dog will be more willing to work successfully through difficult exercises.
Question 8	How important are reinforcers?
Answer	Reinforcers use the dog's drives to achieve desired behaviors.
Question 9	What is the difference between toys and training tools?
Answer	The toys the dog is allowed to play with are "their" items, to have around the house. The trainers' toys (tools) are items such as tugs, balls, etc. which are used to interactively reward the dog for short play sessions after completing the desired behavior. These tools are not for the dog to play with by themselves.

Question 10	How do you teach straight fronts?
Answer	Use a platform box or front frame to help the dog know the correct position. Use overlapping alternating hands so the dog does not favor one side to the other. Be sure to bring the treat to the center of your body.
Question 11	What is a nose bridge and why is it important?
Answer	A nose bridge is finger placement to keep your dog occupied and in position while waiting for the next exercise. It is a helpful behavior to have when there is a delay in the start of the next exercise.
Question 12	Where can you find the rules for chewing and what is the adventage of reading
	Where can you find the rules for showing and what is the advantage of reading them?
Answer	They can be found at AKC.org. The advantage is that you will be better prepared. "The team that is most prepared, is the team that will win."

Question 13	When should you stop your training session?
Answer	It is best to end training sessions while your dog is still engaged. End on a high
	note. To help the dog know when the session is over, use a turn-off switch com-
	mand such as "All done." Stop training immediately and transition to other activi-
	ties not part of the training routine.



T3 - Unusual Rewards with Sandi Myers

In all aspects of life, we humans tend to go with the familiar or routine. Tuesday night, Sept. 24, was all about thinking outside the treat pouch and making rewards more fun for our dogs. Sandi presented a wide range of ideas. Using bowls to get a solid kickback stand. I was amazed at the speed the dogs picked up on that. Everyone learned how a brown paper lunch bag can stimulate our dogs prey drive and get them more engaged in the process. Sandi went over how simple household items, such as crumbled paper, could provide distractions. How changing the reward placement to your right side so the dog must go behind you can help prevent forging. Also, a discussion of using jackpots within the training area so the dog doesn't think that big rewards only happen when they are outside the ring. Sammy was such a cute demo dog...played his role perfectly. Thank you Sandi and Sammy for a fun and informative night.





Annie's Dinner as Jackpot As created by Donna Rock, and transcribed by Sharon McDonald

(Permission has been granted to Sandi Myers to share this information, please do not copy for other classes).



Below is a description of the Jackpot reward methodology used with great success by Donna Rock for her Doberman, Annie. Donna was inspired to try jackpotting following a Bridget Carlson seminar. With assistance also from Julie Hill, Donna adapted the jackpot reward to suit Annie's specific motivational needs. Donna's adapted method is described below.

PREFACE: I have personally trained with and observed Annie both before and after Donna began using this method of reward. This, combined with a dedicated and deliberate training program, made a noticeable difference in Annie's ring demeanor. I recently sat with Donna and had her describe the reward methodology to me so that I could use it in my own program with my dachshunds. Since my memory stinks, I prepared the below description. Donna reviewed and edited so that I get it as accurate as possible. // Sharon McDonald

Foundation thoughts:

- "Name" your jackpot. Donna used "dinner." Select a word that you may already use at meal time and you'll have a head start.
- Build slowly; this cannot be stressed enough! You must build the drive for the jackpot and slowly add in the jackpot as a reward following work.
- Once you start, dog should not get dinner without some level of working.
- One "session" means one day or one feeding/meal.

Week One: Introduction and Conditioning of the Jackpot

"Dinner" is Annie's jackpot word.

1. Prepare dinner in front of dog.

2. Talk to dog as you prepare the food, repeatedly using your name for the jackpot. You are building excitement and interest. (Ex: Oooooh, is this your DINNER? Look at this DINNER! Yummy yummy DINNER!)

- 3. Divide dinner into 2 3 portions, with only one portion in the bowl at a time.
- 4. Place bowl on ground, but do not let dog have it yet.

5. From a distance of about 10 ft from the bowl, restrain dog by collar or leash, direct the dog's attention to the bowl and say: Ooooh, there's your DINNER! Are you ready for DINNER? and so forth.

6. When the dog is clearly showing excitement/energy, perhaps lunging forward (which is great!), release while saying "OK - Go get your DINNER"!

7. This is important – ALLOW dog to consume the entire contents of the bowl. Do not interrupt.

8. Once dog consumes the contents, let dog see you refill with yet another portion, again making a big deal as in step #2. Repeat steps 2 thru 6 for each portion.

Note – Dog may get bored with too many portions. Limit to 3 during this critical conditioning period.

Week Two: Introduction of Informal Work (Tricks)

The dinner was essentially "free" in Week One. Now add directed work so the dinner becomes a reward.

1 – 4: steps #1 through #4 of Week 1 are a foundation that will always be repeated in each session.

We pick up where there is a bowl of food on the ground, dog is excited ...

5. Tell dog "it's time to WORK" ... "Wait, you have to WORK" ... and other such comments to punctuate the word "WORK".

6. Select a trick that the dog knows and really likes to do, and is very simple, such as speak, spin, twist, sit up, give paw, wave ... You will perform only that one trick for that working session. (Ex: Monday, spin; Tuesday, speak; Wednesday, wave.)

7. Ask the dog to perform the trick. When dog does, mark with "yes".

8. Immediately release dog by saying "OK, go get your dinner"

9. Repeat using same trick for remaining portions of dinner.

Week Three: Building Informal Work

Perform exactly as in Week Two, but now add in one more trick; so you are asking dog to do two tricks before releasing to the jackpot.

• Again, do the same two tricks for all repetitions of that session.

Note – Keep tricks as fun, easy, and informal work!

At this stage, dog should be getting pretty excited when you are prepping dinner, showing excitement to perform the tricks, and great energy to dash to the bowl for reward when released. IF NOT, continue to work at building the drive for the tricks. Moving too fast into formal work may cause you to lose your jackpot.

Week Four: Introducing Formal Work

Now it's time to introduce formal work ... such as competition obedience exercises.

Since you are simply "introducing" formal work, a "formal run thru" of an entire exercise from set up to finish is not advisable at this conditioning phase. Each formal exercise can be broken into its' individual training components.

Keep in perspective that, in this process, your focus is on conditioning the reward (give me this formal work and you get the reward).

Your choice of exercises will depend on the level of obedience training your dog is presently working.

Steps 1 – **4** are same as always.

5. Select one single exercise to work for each session. For this illustration, let's use heeling.

- 6. Having completed step 4, tell dog "It's time to WORK. Let's get to WORK"
- 7. Set up and perform a very short 10ft heeling pattern, maybe one turn and one halt.
- 8. The FIRST time the dog performs satisfactorily, mark with yes, release saying "OK, go get your dinner"

9. If dog is amped to get the dinner and is having difficulty focusing on the exercise, just be patient and keep demanding "Ah ah ... time to work or Not yet, work first"

10. DO NOT drill the exercise over and over before releasing. Don't rush this process.

11. Repeat the same exercise using the remaining portions of dinner.

Week Five: Gradually Build Formal Work

GRADUAL is a crucial word in this process. Each obedience exercise can be broken into training components. Gradually build your formal work to add the various components to each exercise.

In this week, using heeling as the example, simply increase the distance and number of turns of the heeling pattern.

* Special Note: While building the formal, intersperse formal work with tricks. EX: Perform a formal exercise for portion 1, then a trick for portion 2, then back to formal for portion 3.

Week Six: Even More Formal Work

By week six, try a formal run thru of an obedience exercise. Use this as your gauge ... where are you? If dog is losing enthusiasm, back up and continue to work Week 5. If pepped and ready, continue at the more formal level.

Week Seven: Final Formal Build and Randomizing

Continue to increase number of exercises OR repetition of exercises.

However, begin to randomize the timing of when you release. Randomize and be truly unpredictable.

Randomizing and being unpredictable will be key in maintaining the dog's enthusiasm and energy throughout and will decrease the likelihood of energy extremes (too flat or too frenzied.)

Final thoughts:

- * Patience and do not rush can't stress enough!
- * Avoid use of other treats as "instant reward" (at least not until you've perfected the jackpot).
- * Incorporate jackpots at matches / show-n-go's.

Toys for Our Dogs Who Are 80 Pound Bulldogs

Ne like to buy very durable dog toys as our dogs love to chew them up and have very powerful jaws. We look for

things that squeak as that adds a level of excitement as does anything that can be thrown and used to play tug with us. So our favorite brands and items are as follows:

Kong Wubbas: XL size for us! They come in S, M, L, & XL and squeak, are made of durable reinforced nylon and have long floppy strings. There are actually 2 balls inside, one for the bounce and one for the squeak:) Kong sells lots of kinds of Wubbas,

some with cute heads and ears, some made of silky materials and the ones we get, the Kong Wubba classic. We have tried them all, the ears and cute heads get eaten off, the silky fabric doesn't hold up to a string or two in the mouth while a human pulls the other end. So we stick with the classic plain ones as they last a long time. The squeaker part dies within 2 weeks or so but the actual toy is still good for throwing and tugging for a good 6 weeks or so.





Kong AirDog Football: Large for us! Comes in S, M & L. This also squeaks and is made of the non-abrasive felt to be safe for dog teeth. It has an erratic bounce due to the shape and they love to retrieve it when we throw it and then come tease us by annoying-



ly squeaking it and wanting us to try to grab for it. They run around squeaking and playing with them, (they each have one) until we bring out Greenies so that they will trade us the football for the Greenie. These last about a week or two as they do like to "pop" them with their jaws and then they work on chewing

them "open" and then we take them away.

We also like some of the Outward Hound toys, again for durability and we recently tried some Bite-Force toys that squeak too. But neither of these lasts as long as the Kong Wubbas which are a daily play session toy.



On the weekends, we also use Chunkit! Flying Squirrel Dog Toys for long runs

in an open field and we also like the Chunkit! Kick Fetch Ball (looks like a sort of weird soccer ball.) But the ball is made of rubber and foam so if our monsters each want the same ball and both try to "tug it" it can quickly pull apart or tear open and then they go for the "gutting action" to destroy it. So we use 4 squirrels and 4 balls so that one of whatever is always in motion, being thrown so they keep focused on chasing and not just tugging between them.



We also use Benebone chew sticks and wishbones for the dogs to chew on. The dogs can quickly get them chewed up (so they are



spiky and rough) so my husband uses his grinder to grind them smooth and then the dogs can chew again. This makes them last a very long time which is good because each bone or stick is about \$20 so we want them to last as long as possible. We of course have to buy the largest sizes provided.



Toys I Recommend

I have great results with this Stufferz beaver toy that you can stuff with an empty water bottle. It makes a crackly sound when it's compressed, and a long beaver tail for holding that end while my dog is busy crunching the body. For added attraction I throw in some smelly treats in the body cavity along with the bottle.

The photo shows the tail folded to the body. I got it at Amazon <u>here</u>. My dogs aren't into tug war but I can get them pretty involved with this and then the fun (and reward) can start.

Legislative Liaison Update

A fter I stood up and discussed Legislative issues at our Sept. DTCDC General Meeting, I was asked some questions. I wanted to share the correct answers with all of you as I was a bit "fuzzy" and "nervous" about speaking in public and on camera at the meeting so some of my info was lacking correct specifics or proper explanation. So here is a follow-up for anyone who didn't attend the meeting, or see my post to our DTCDC Facebook page with this info the day after our September meeting.

1.) I am currently watching the status of 32 bills in our U. S. Congress although none are more than 50% of the way through the legislative process so I do not report on them unless it looks like

they may become law.

2.) In terms of the Texas Legislature, it will resume in January 2025 and we will see what dog related legislation is introduced and report on it as needed.

3.) The countries that have banned or restricted the breeding of brachycephalic dogs are Austria, Germany, the Netherlands and Norway.

Note: Brachycephalic breeds are dogs who have shortened heads, short snouts and/or flat faces.

4.) The state in the U.S. that was attempting to also ban or restrict the breeding and sale of brachycephalic dogs was New Hampshire in March 2024. Legislation was introduced for this ban and was vigorously opposed by AKC and New Hampshire dog enthusiasts, thank goodness! The reason this type of restrictive legislation is alarming is because there are a great many breeds that are either brachycephalic or have ancestors who were brachycephalic so some breeds or just some dogs within a breed, can still have those brachycephalic traits and issues.

5.) Here are some of the brachycephalic breeds:

Affenpinscher, Affenpug, Airedale Terrier, American Cocker Spaniel, American Staffordshire Terrier, American Pit Bull Terrier, Boston Terrier, Boxer, Brasilieiro, Brussels Griffon, Bull Terriers, English, French and American Bulldog, Bullmastiff, Cane Corso, Cavalier King Charles Spaniel, Chihuahua, Chow Chow, Dogue de Bordeaux, Japanese Chin, Lhasa Apso, Mastiff, Newfoundland, Pekingese, Pug, Rottweiler, Staffordshire Bull Terrier, Shih Tzus, and I am sure there are others.

So you can certainly see why AKC was greatly concerned about New Hampshire's desire to ban the breeding and sale of these breeds!

I do hope you all went back and read the May and August PawPrint Legislative Liaison Update columns about how we can help AKC to influence legislation in our favor in both the Texas Legislature and the U. S. Congress. If you haven't gone back to read those articles, please go do it now! Remember, back issues of PawPrint are available to us in our members' section on our DTCDC website.

Sample Club Introduction Letter

This letter may be altered for state representatives, governors, local officials and other office holders. This letter may be emailed, printed and mailed, or for maximum effect, consider writing it neatly by hand on nice stationery and mailing or hand-delivering it your representative's office.

If you are writing on behalf of your club, consider including a page or two that briefly outlines the good things your club does in the community.

If your club has an upcoming show, competition, field trial, or other event, consider inviting the lawmaker to attend. Offer them a tour, and consider inviting them to present the Best in Show award. Let them know that this is an excellent opportunity to meet other dog-owning constituents and learn what you are doing to promote responsible dog ownership in the community.





DID YOUR DOG EARN AN OBEDIENCE AND/OR RALLY TITLE DURING THE PERIOD NOVEMBER 15, 2023 TO NOVEMBER 14, 2024? If so, you may qualify for the following awards DTCDC will present at the annual Holiday Party and Awards Ceremony.

The <u>Highest Average Obedience Score Award and Highest Average Rally Score Award</u> are awarded to the club member achieving the highest average score on the three legs required to earn an Obedience Title (i.e., CD, CDX, UD equivalent from AKC, ASCA, UKC) and the club member achieving the highest average score on the three legs required to earn a Rally Title (i.e., RN, RA, RE equivalent from AKC, ASCA, UKC). To qualify: By November 15th Club members submit the form on the next page indicating the dates, names of the shows, and the scores for each leg to the Purchasing Committee Chairperson, who determines which club members had the highest average Obedience and Rally scores. The third leg of the eligible scores must be earned during the period of November 15 of the previous year to November 14 of the current year. There is no limit on the number of times a club member may earn and receive these awards. The awards are presented annually by DTCDC.

The <u>Most Improved Obedience Score Award and Most Improved Rally Score Award</u> are awarded to the club member achieving the greatest point score improvement between any two of the three legs required to earn an Obedience title (i.e., CD, CDX, UD equivalent from AKC, ASCA, UKC) and the club member achieving the greatest point score improvement between any two of the three legs required to earn a Rally Title (i.e., RN, RA, RE equivalent from AKC, ASCA, UKC). To qualify: By November 15th Club members submit the form on the next page indicating the dates, names of the shows, and the scores for each leg to the Purchasing Committee Chairperson, who determines which club members had the most improvement between scores. The third leg of the eligible scores must be earned during the period of November 15 of the previous year to November 14 of the current year. There is no limit on the number of times a club member may earn and receive these awards. The awards are presented annually by DTCDC.

HOW TO SUBMIT YOUR SCORES: Scores must be submitted via U.S. Mail or email to Lynda Holman **BY NOVEMBER 15, 2024**. Fill in the information on the Award Submission Form on the next page and send to Lynda. **Use a separate form for each award for which you are submitting scores.** Scores submitted are to be for each of the three legs required to earn the degree. 4th legs do not count. The first 2 legs of the degree can be received at any prior time, but the 3rd leg that earned the degree must be received during the period November 15, 2023 to November 14, 2024. Highest Average is an average of the legs that earned the title. Most Improved must be points between 1st and 2nd, 2nd and 3rd, or 1st and 3rd legs. It cannot go backwards.
